## greetings from the chair

It is my privilege to bring you greetings from the Chair, and to touch upon some highlights of another great year for Prairie Hospice Society (PHS).

We continue to add amazing individuals as client service volunteers and have now trained over 120 people who are the heart of caring. These volunteers support so many people at end-of-life, fulfilling our vision of helping people live well until they die. We have served more than 250 terminally ill persons, along with their families and primary caregivers. In the words of the Health Authority referral agents, our volunteers 'lift families' and our clients 'have better outcomes' because of these caring volunteers.

We continue to spread the word and raise public awareness about PHS and the services we provide. Last fall, the two benefit concerts performed by Wilma Groenen, Brett Balon and the Divas of Caswell, along with the garden party hosted by Penny Stalker and Ken Coutu, allowed us to reach hundreds of new friends. Many more people are aware of our services, potential new volunteers came forward and much needed funds were raised. Our third annual Charity Golf Classic raised more than \$55,000 due to the efforts of the co-chairs Kathy Ford and Ken Howland and their innovative team of committee members. Our financial position has never been stronger; helped also by a legacy gift we received honouring Brian and Marsha DeLouchery Day.

We are also working to enrich the programs we offer to the people we support. In 2017/18, we finished the introductory work on two projects that could lead shortly into new services. The first is a family grief and bereavement program that will allow us to provide better bereavement supports to the families of our clients that need us. The second is pilot work on the NavCare project through which we could train our volunteers and staff to help our clients navigate the medical and social support systems.

No organization can achieve great success without strong staff members. Muriel Dickson, Rick Schellenberg, and Sheila Morgan are outstanding employees who serve our clients with caring and compassion, tirelessly support our volunteers and ensure our Board is prepared to provide the governance so needed in a community-based organization. Steven Senkin-Hiebert fills in admirably when Rick or Sheila is away. I believe no charitable agency in Saskatoon can match Prairie Hospice with such a capable and friendly workforce. They are incredible!

In closing, I would like once again to thank my fellow Board members who make it such a joy to be the Chair of this fine hard-working group. I repeat my comment from last year - this is the most contributive, collegial and supportive Board upon which I have ever served.

## INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONERS' REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Members of Prairie Hospice Society Inc.

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Prairie Hospice Society Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at May 31, 2018, the statements of operations and net assets for the year then ended, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

### *Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements*

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### *Practitioners' Responsibility*

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

### *Conclusion*

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Prairie Hospice Society Inc. as at May 31, 2018, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.





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## **Nature of operations:**

Prairie Hospice Society Inc. (the "Not for profit corporation") is incorporated as a non-profit organization under the laws of Saskatchewan. The purpose of the Society is to ensure access to community-based end of life support.

The Society is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes, provided certain requirements of the Income Tax Act are met. The Society is able to issue charitable donation receipts for income tax purposes.

## **1. Significant accounting policies:**

### **(a) Basis of presentation:**

The financial statements are prepared by management in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook.

### **(b) Use of estimates:**

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### **(c) Cash and cash equivalents:**

Cash and cash equivalents consists of balances with financial institutions which have an initial term to maturity of three months or less.

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## 1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

### (d) Financial instruments:

Financial instruments (cash and cash equivalents, grants receivable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities) are recorded at fair value on initial recognition and subsequently measured at amortized cost.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Society determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Society expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

### (e) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are expensed when acquired.

### (f) Revenue recognition:

The Society recognizes contributions in accordance with the deferral method of accounting.

Under the deferral method, externally restricted contributions that remain unfulfilled are accumulated as deferred revenue on the statement of financial position and are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recognized.

Grants and sponsorships are recorded as revenue in the period in which they relate. Grants approved but not received at the end of an accounting period are accrued. Where a portion of a grant is related to a future period, it is deferred and recognized in that subsequent period.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

### (g) Contributed Services:

A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year. Because of the difficulty of determining the fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

## 2. Deferred revenue:

Deferred revenue related to expenses of future periods represent unspent externally restricted grants, donations and sponsorships for specific programs or events.

## 3. Financial risks management:

The Society's financial instruments consist of cash, grants receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The carrying value of these instruments approximate their fair value due to the short period to maturity.

The Society has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

### (a) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Society will be unable to fulfil its obligations as they become due. The Society manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements and ensuring it has sufficient funds to fulfil its obligations.

### (b) Credit risk:

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty may default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss. The Society is not exposed to market risk or significant credit risk. Credit risk related to cash and cash equivalents is minimized by dealing with financial institutions that have strong credit ratings. Credit risk related to grants receivable is considered minimal as accounts are short-term in nature and relate to receivables from government agencies, corporations and not-for-profit foundations.

### (c) Interest rate risk:

The Society is exposed to interest rate risk on its chequing and savings accounts. The risk is considered minimal due to the short-term nature of the accounts.

## 4. Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets not recorded in the statement of financial position include computer equipment. \$nil of computer equipment was expensed in the current year (2017 - \$1,907).



### JUNE 1, 2017 TO MAY 31, 2018

We have served 108 clients over the course of this fiscal year, 44 continuing from previous years and 64 added as the year went along. That works out to just about 9 referrals a month (compared with 7 last year). From January 2013 we have served 237 people and their families.



